# Middle Harbour Remediation Dredging








 Late 1800s – W.J. Pendray
Soap Factory at Humbolt and Douglas Streets, backing onto James Bay mud flats.

 Around 1890s – Pendray opened a paint factory next to the soap factory.



- Around 1900:
  - James Bay mudflats filled in
  - Inner Harbour Causeway and Empress Hotel constructed
  - Pendray moved factories to Laurel Point.




View of Inner Harbour Causeway retaining wall construction

#### **BAPCO Paint Factory**



#### Hazardous Substances in Paint

- Lead: Made paint more flexible and water resistant
- Other metals:
  - Arsenic
  - Cadmium
  - Chrome
  - Copper
  - Zinc
- PCBs: Used in pigments

- BAPCO Paint Factory was in operation for 74 at Laurel Point
- During that time there was likely spills and possible dumping in the ocean
- Resulted in a contaminated seabed around Laurel Point
- PCBs banned in 1970s

### Middle Harbour Remediation Dredging

- Contract awarded to Milestone Contractors partnered with FRPD
- Contract amount: \$5.3 million
- Scope of work:
  - Dredging of contaminated sediment
  - Offsite treatment of these sediments
  - Disposal of treated material
  - Backfilling and capping of seabed with selected materials
- Construction period: 4 months
